FOREIGN LANGUAGES CURRICULUM

Foreign languages represent an important part of the traditional liberal arts curriculum that is increasingly relevant in the interdependent global community of the twenty-first century. Knowledge of one or more foreign languages is a valuable asset for students considering graduate school or seeking employment in the international field. Students at The New School have the opportunity to study more than 12 foreign languages at levels from beginner to advanced.

Foreign Languages at The New School are offered as part of:

- 1. The Undergraduate Degree program (4-credit language courses, which meet twice a week for 100 minutes per class during the day)
- 2. The Continuing Education program:
 - once a week for three hours and forty five minutes (13 sessions 0 or 4 credits)
 - twice a week for one hour fifty minutes (26 sessions 0 or 4 credits)
 - once a week for one hour fifty minutes (13 sessions 0 or 2 credits)
 - once a week for one hour fifty minutes (15 sessions 0 or 3 credits)
 - combination course meeting some sessions onsite once a week for one hour fifty minutes and some sessions online (15 sessions – 0 or 3 credits)
 - 14 hours over one weekend (3 days non-credit)

Degree students interested in Arabic, Chinese, French, Italian, Japanese, Latin, or Spanish should, whenever possible, register for 4-credit courses. Degree students interested in languages only offered through the Adult Education program (i.e. German) may register for courses offered through the continuing education program.

Placement in the appropriate level:

- Students who have studied a language in high school or college can place themselves in the appropriate level by using the following formula: one year of high school foreign language equals one semester of foreign language study at the college level. For example, a student who has completed one year of high school Spanish should enroll in Spanish 2.
- Students with questions or with reason to believe that this does not accurately measure their knowledge of a foreign language (e.g., it has been several years since they last studied the language) should either call (212.229.5676) or email (foreignlanguages@newschool.edu) the Department office to set up an appointment to discuss alternate placement and/or take a placement test.

Before traveling to the Middle East, stop at The New School for a weekend immersion in Arabic. Make rapid progress learning to converse in Levantine Arabic. Master common situations, such as asking for directions, handling currency, ordering in restaurants, and shopping. Level 1 is for complete beginners; Level 2 is for students familiar with basic elements of Arabic. Since the focus of this course is conversation, phonetic transliterations are used. Each workshop meets Friday, 6:00–9:30 p.m.; Saturday, 10:00 a.m.–5:00 p.m. (with a one-hour lunch break); and Sunday, 10:30 a.m.–3:00 p.m., for a total of 14 hours of instruction. (non-credit)

This accelerated first course integrates Modern Standard Arabic (Fus-ha) and Levantine Arabic, introducing the Arabic alphabet and sound system along with basic conversational skills in Levantine. Students learn to engage in simple conversations and write short compositions about themselves, their families, and other familiar topics. This course is for beginners who would like to progress rapidly. (O or 4 credits)

More complex topics of conversation are introduced, such as eating at restaurants, shopping at the market, and visiting places. Students learn about the cultures of Jordan, Syria, Lebanon, and Palestine while enhancing their communicative skills. Prerequisite: Introductory Intensive 1 or the equivalent (0 or 4 credits)

The emphasis is on oral communication, students will also develop reading and writing skills in preparation for their time abroad. Note: Students who are applying for the New School Study Abroad Program in Shanghai, China, are strongly encouraged to enroll in this course. (O or 2 credits)
